

John: Let's see, oh yeah, that was in our down year, that was in 1960. And then we, then sales began to pick up by a little bit. And then we were in that old Quonset hut over there on Chestnut, no it wasn't Chestnut, right down by the old plant in Monrovia. At that time we had sold out Walker-Renaker and taken the money from that and bought the place out in San Dimas where I was running the nursery business there. We had green houses. Fixing up the old chicken ranch. And then we moved out there and lived in the old house where Susan's place is now, the old ranch house. And we lived there for two or three years. But at that time we had nothing there but plants.

Bill was doing better with the pottery over there, running the pottery plant for us in Monrovia. And he said; Jim and I were working out there at the nursery, fixing that all up, and Bill said why don't you guys make me a building out here, a pottery building? We're doing more business, we need it. So, we made a pottery building. That was about, I think the year that we began to take off with increased sales was about 1967. And we did very well every year it was even better. And so, uh, I think until, oh actually about 1972. And that year I moved down here.

Nancy: To Encinitas?

J: Uh huh. Bought the nursery down here.

N: Completely? Left San Dimas completely?

J: Yeah. Always doing drastic things.
